***“Conversations on SC History with Dr. Walter Edgar”***

Making South Carolina history real for our students is a daunting task for our middle and high school teachers. ***“Conversations on SC History with Dr. Walter Edgar”*** is comprised of 23 lessons/20 minutes from Tom Fowler’s interview with noted South Carolina historian, Dr. Walter Edgar. Produced by ITV with ETV, this new series begins with a focus on geography and moves from pre-history through Colonial history, The Revolution, The Civil War, Reconstruction era, and then to the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries. Each lesson highlights a specific topic of interest in our state’s history and how South Carolina impacted the nation. The 23 lessons include the following segments:
